"White As Snow"

"Come now, let us reason together, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow" – Isaiah 1:18

One of the joys of New England winters for my family is watching the snow delicately come down. After serving in south Arkansas for twenty years, I seldom saw any snow during the winter months. Living in western Massachusetts, I have observed a certain beauty in this white substance. After the snow has stopped falling, it glistens off the sunlight/moonlight and looks like a collection of valuable gems waiting to be placed into a very expensive crown. It looks so pure and clean as it floats down from the heavens to the earth. The type of snow that I like to shovel resembles powdered sugar - fluffy and lightweight.

In the opening chapter of his book, the prophet Isaiah had taken the nation of Israel to task. He had spoken honestly to a people and a nation, complaining that the people had rebelled against God and that the spiritual children He had lovingly nourished were no longer eager to serve Him. Isaiah had drawn a comparison between the people of Israel and their God and animals and their owners. In chapter 1, verse 3, he writes "The ox knows its owner, and the donkey its master's crib, but Israel does not know, My people do not understand."

The prophet Isaiah speaks to the people in a serious manner. He says they are a sinful nation and a people burdened with sin. He reminds them of the fact that they have forsaken the Lord and provoked the Holy One of Israel to anger. Isaiah complains that the entire nation of Israel is full of wounds and bruises and oozing sores. There is not a single spot on the body of Israel that does not have some sign of sickness and disease.

God came to His people then and comes to His people today with a wonderful invitation extended by the prophet. He urges us not only to reason together and repent, but to reason together for our own comfort and reassurance in order to receive the wonderful blessings we have in the promises of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Isaiah had preached repentance. He had urged the people to turn and invited them to return to God. He had given them the greatest comfort on earth. When they repented, acknowledged their wretchedness, turned back to God, became as wise as the ox and the other farm animals, and received God's richest blessings, then God Himself would wash all their sins away. What was scarlet in transgression and red in iniquity, God would make as white as snow (purity) and as clean as cleansed wool, which is ready to be made into a fine garment.

When we have trouble in our soul and in our heart, and our whole body feels discouraged, here come the wonderful, refreshing words of the prophet Isaiah: "Come now, let us reason together, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." When we are without comfort and experience turmoil, we are reminded of the words written in Romans, Chapter 15: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." When we are in distress, we hear the words of Psalm 46: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear."

Then we look to Mount Calvary

and we see the holy, innocent Son of God hanging on the cross. We see the suffering Jesus forsaken even by His own Father. We hear His anguishing cry: "My God, my God, why have You forsaken Me?" We see Him a little while later, knowing that everything has been accomplished, and saying "It is finished!" What a great blessing we have in our Lord Jesus Christ! What a great blessing we have in our Savior Jesus Christ, the One Who saves and cleanses our souls!

A PRAYER FOR THE NEW YEAR

Lord of the past, present, and future, forgive us our sins of this day and this past year. Do not hold our offenses against us, but show us Your abundant mercy. Enable us through the power of Your Spirit to *lead holy lives according to Your* commandments. Cleanse us of our failings each day through the blessings of our Baptism. Give us a thirst for hearing, reading, and *learning Your Word. By regularly* receiving our Savior Jesus Christ's true Body and true Blood, prepare us for life in the new year of 2019 as Your redeemed and holy people. Now and in the new year, O Lord, be with us. Amen.

With Thanksgiving

The world is full of heartache. Heartaches of all kinds: financial difficulties, health problems, broken relationships, job stresses. You can name more. Look around you, and often you can see hurt in people's eyes. More often, we learn to mask our hurt and present a "happy face." The apostle Paul had plenty of heartaches, too. He was beaten, stoned, shipwrecked, without a home of his own, in danger from the elements, from enemies, and, sadly, in danger from false brothers. He suffered from hunger, the cold, and lack of clothing. He felt the pressure of concern for the

new churches he established and served. (2 Corinthians 11:16-33.)

Surely Paul had a right to complain, not just to those who brought these calamities upon him, but to God Who allowed them! So we might think, anyway. Not so! Paul boasted in his weakness, in the circumstances over which he had no control, for he knew God was in control. "That is why," Paul said in 2 Corinthians 12:10, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, in insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

Paul taught the new Christians to depend on God for all their needs:

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6). That twoword phrase in the middle is easy to miss: "with thanksgiving." And why should we not pray with thanksgiving, knowing we have a gracious God Who delights to bless us! Why should we not pray with thanksgiving, knowing we have a God Who has spared not even His own Son (Romans 8:32)! Should we lose all, we still pray with thanksgiving that nothing can separate us from our Savior.
